03 May 2021

**WINDHOEK** 

1. We announce one hundred and fifty-two (152) new COVID-19 confirmed cases from one thousand one hundred and forty-six (1 146) results in the last twenty-four (24) hours, which represents 13% positivity ratio. The gender distribution of the reported cases is ninety-three (93) females and fifty-nine (59) males. The age ranges from two (2) years to ninety-one (91) years. The new COVID-19 cases are distributed as follows:
