UPDATE BY DR. KALUMBI SHANGULA, MINISTER OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES ON COVID-19 IN NAMIBIA.

19 April 2021

WINDHOEK

1. We announce one hundred and eighteen (118) new COVID-19 confirmed cases identified from one thousand one hundred and twenty-two (1 122) results received from the laboratories in the last twenty-four (24) hours, which represents 11% positivity ratio. The gender distribution of the reported cases is seventy-one (71) females and forty-seven (47) males. The age ranges from one (1) year to eighty-eight (88) years. The new COVID-19 cases are geographically distributed as follows:

- 2. We continue to report COVID-19 cases from all corners of the country. Today we recorded cases from thirteen (13) regions, except Zambezi. Among the confirmed cases are thirty (30) learners and fifteen (15) teachers from different schools. Six (6) health care workers also tested positive for COVID-19.
- **3.** Six regions recorded two hundred and thirty-five (235) recoveries as follow:

4. The total number of active cases currently stands at one thousand three hundred and ninety-eight (1 398). One hundred and five (105) are hospitalized, of which thirty-six (36) are in ICUs.

8. Key messages

- 8.1. We are experiencing an increase in the number of hospitalisation and deaths due to Covid19. As we are approaching winter time, where people tend to be closer together and in
 close settings, we anticipate further increase in the number of cases with subsequent
 increase in hospitalization and deaths. At the same we are seeing non compliance with
 regulations made under the Public and Environmental Health Act of 2015, especially in
 respect of curfew and public gatherings. We have seen visuals of church events with the
 number of attendees way beyond the permissible number who are not even bothered to
 observe mandatory public health measures.
- 8.2. I applaud the efforts of the law enforcement officers in enforcing the curfew. This is commendable indeed. We have always advocated for voluntary compliance on the side of the church. We thank those churches who have rendered their cooperation. In the event of failure by some churches and organisers of public events to comply, we will be compelled to invoke Section 29(3) of the Public and Environmental Act of 2015 which provides as follow:

"A person who contravenes or fails to comply with a directive issued or regulations made under subsection (1) [of the Act] commits an offence and is liable to a fine not exceeding N\$100 000 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding 10 years, or to both such fine and imprisonment".

- 8.3. Covid-19 has compelled us to do things differently. It has compelled us to worship, mourn our loved one, raise money and work differently. Our preoccupation should always be the preservation of lives of our citizens and our members. We see this as a responsibility of all of us. Let us all pull together in the same direction.
- 8.4. On Friday the 16 April 2021, Namibia received the first consignment of the vaccines that was bought by government. I have also launched Phase II of the vaccination campaign that have started today throughout the country. I therefore invite all Namibians to go to your nearest vaccination site in your vicinity and get vaccinated with the vaccine of your choice that fits your profile. All public hospitals are doing vaccination. We have also established mobile vaccination teams in order to ensure that nobody is left out.
