UPDATE BY DR. KALUMBI SHANGULA, MINISTER OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES ON COVID-19 IN NAMIBIA.

23 February 2021

WINDHOEK *Check against Delivery Good afternoon fellow Namibians. We announce one hundred and fifty-four (154) new COVID-19 confirmed cases identified from one thousand two hundred and six (1 206) results received from the laboratories in the last twenty-four (24) hours, which represents 13% positivity ratio. The gender distribution of the reported cases is seventy-eight (78) males and seventy-six (76) females. The age range is from six (6) months to seventy-nine (79) years. The new COVID-19 cases are geographically distributed as follows:

- 2. Sixty-nine (69) of the positive cases are learners. Twenty-four (24) are from Haudano Senior Secondary (SSS) in Oshikuku district, nineteen (19) from Mariental High School and the rest are from different schools. Oshikuku district cases include Fifteen (15) Inmates from Etayi Police Holding Cells. Four (4) health care workers, three (3) from Windhoek district and one (1) from Onandjokwe district, and three (3) teachers from different schools are among the positive cases.
- **3.** We have recorded one hundred and forty-six (146) new recoveries. The recovery rate stands at 93%.

6. Key messages

- Regular routine cleaning and disinfecting of school facilities as per the COVID-19 Infection Prevention and Control guidance must be implemented by all schools.
