UPDATE BY DR. KALUMBI SHANGULA, MINISTER OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES ON COVID-19 IN NAMIBIA.

28 February 2021

1. We announce two hundred and three (203) new COVID-19 confirmed cases identified from one thousand four hundred and thirty-four (1 434) results received from the laboratories in the last twenty-four (24) hours, which represents 14% positivity ratio. The gender distribution of the reported cases is one hundred and fourteen (114) females and eighty-nine (89) males. The age range is from five (5) months to ninety-one (91) years. The new COVID-19 cases are geographically distributed as follows:

- One hundred and five (105) of the positive cases are learners. Eighteen (18) are from Onesi Senior Secondary School (SSS) in Tsandi district, seventeen (17) from Leevi Hakusembe SSS in Rundu district, eleven (11) from J A Nel SSS in Keetmanshoop district and the rest are from different schools. Ten (10) health care workers and five (5) teachers are among the positive cases.
- **3.** We have recorded forty-one (41) new recoveries. The recovery rate for Namibia stands at 93%.

4. The total number of active cases currently stands at two thousand one hundred and fifty-two (2 152). One hundred and fifty-six (156) are hospitalized, of which twenty (20) are in ICUs.
